U.S. Supports Patent Waivers To Produce Covid-19 Vaccines

WASHINGTON—The U.S. said it would support the temporary waiver of intellectual property provisions to allow developing nations to produce Covid-19 vaccines created by pharmaceutical companies, cit-ing an urgent need to stem the

ing an urgent need to stem the pandemic.

Overriding objections from the pharmaceutical industry, the U.S. will support a proposal working its way through the World Trade Organization, said U.S. Trade Representative Kath-erine Tai. Such a policy would waive the IP rights of vaccine makers to potentially enable companies in developing coun-

tries and others to manufacture their own versions of Covid-19


tries and others to manufacture their own versions of Covid-19 vaccines.

"The Administration believes strongly in intellectual property protections, but in service of ending this pandemic, supports the waiver of those protections for Covid-19 vaccines," Ms. Tai said Wednesday.

The waiver has been pushed by countries including India and South Africa that are suffering from an explosion in new cases. In India, it was reported recently that less than 2% of the population had been vaccinated, and new Covid-19 cases are at record highs globally as the pandemic rages unchecked in many poor and middle-income countries.

Pharmaceutical companies, however, said the waiver won't provide the short-term results proponents think it will—in part because of the challenge of setting up complex new production facilities to manufacture the vaccines.

The Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers of America, a lobbying and trade group, said the Biden administration's decision will weaken already-strained supply chains and spur counterfeit vaccines. "This decision does nothing Please turn to page A8

Just over a year ago, Soren Bjorn, who helps run the world's biggest berry company, made a bad call.

Demand for fresh berries was falling as the onset of a pandemic shut restaurants, while grocers focused on keeping staples in stock. Mr. Bjorn, president of the Americas division of Driscoll's Inc., told farmers in California to plant fewer strawberries.

Then, Americans stuck at home went on a berry binge. Strawberry demand surged. This March, Mr. Bjorn made the opposite decision, telling farms to increase

their strawberry acres when they plant the crop this fall. Those acres won't yield berries until next spring. "The world will change three times over between now and then," Mr. Bjorn said.

applying a vague, standardless penalty and then referring this case to the board to resolve, Facebook seeks to avoid its responsibilities" itsaid.

It is unclear whether Trump, once an obsessive user of social media with more than 35m followers on Facebook and 24m on Instagram, will be able to regain access. He has not ruled out running again for the White House in 2024.

Nick Clegg, Facebook's vice-president of global affairs and communications, said that the company was "pleased the board has recognised that the unprocedented circumstances justified the exceptional measure we took".

Twitter banned Trump permanently in January, Google's YouTube has suspended him but chief executive Susan Wojcicki said it would lift the freeze once "the risk of violence" decreased.

MEXICO CITY — The mystery surfaced early in the pandemic. Hospitals were jammed with coronavirus victims, but the official death count in Mexico City appeared suspiciously low. Sitting at her dining room table one afternoon, Laurianne Despeghel, a 31-year-old economic consultant, clicked from chart to chart on her laptop, puzzling over how to uncover the real toll.

"I think the data exist," she typed to Mario Romero Zavala, a fellow math geek. She'd heard that death certificates were stored in a database at the city's civil registry. But it would be tough to crack. A day later, Romero

Zavala messaged back with an idea. "I'm going to hurry," the 37-year-old software developer wrote. "I think by tomorrow morning we'll

to hurry," the 37-year-one secondary words. "I think by tomorrow morning we'll have the data."

"VOW!!!" Despeghel typed.

Thus began a cat-and-mouse game with the government that would last nearly a year and catapult the pair to national prominence. Just days after their conversation, they'd conclude that around 8,000 more people had died in Mexico's capital in the first five months of 2020 compared with previous years. By February 2021, they'd count 83,235 excess deaths—more than twice the government's confirmed covid-19 fatality total.

A federal judge in Washington, D.C., ruled Wednesday that the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention overstepped its legal authority by issuing a nationwide eviction moratorium, a ruling that could affect millions of strug

The birthrate in America fell 4 percent last year, marking the biggest annual decrease in dec-ades — suggesting he coronavi-


ades — suggesting the coronavirus pandemic has taken the country's already existing downward trend into overdrive.

New provisional data released Wednesday by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention shows the birthrate in 2020 dropped for the sixth consecutive year. The steepest decline occurred in the last part of the year, when the first babies conceived during the U.S. outbreak would have been born.

Before the pandemic, Ameri-can women were already having fewer children, doing it later in life or choosing to not have chil-dren at all. The newly released data indicated a sharpening of that trend. The U.S. birthrate fell

Cohen, a sociologist at the Uni-versity of Maryland.

While the pandemic may have accelerated the decline, it did not cause it; the slowdown had been ongoing for decades before the pandemic. Even before the pandemics onset, the birthrate had fallen to 1.73 births per woman, after peaking in 1957 at 3.77 births per woman. It dipped in 1980, increased slightly a decade later and has since continued on a steady decline.



Tensions rise over Jersey as PM deploys armed boats

No 10 says measure is 'precautionary' in face of French blockade threat

Boris Johnson dispatched two Royal Navy patrol boats last night to pro-tect Jersey from a feared blockade by French fishing vessels, in an escalation of a dispute over post-Brexit access to waters around the Channel island.

The move followed talks last night between the prime minister and the chief minister of the British crown dependency, John Le Fondré, who had warned Downing Street of imminent movements by French fishing boats to cut off the island's main port.

Jersey's government had already been reeling from comments on Tuesday from France's minister for maritime affairs, Annick Girardin, who had warned that the island's electricity supply could be turned off in retaliation over a lack of access for the French fishing fleet to its waters.

The two Royal Navy river-class patrol boats, HMS Severn and HMS Tamar, were being deployed yesterday and today respectively. Both are armed with two on-deck machine guns and cannon designed to protect against fast-moving attack craft.

HMS Tamar, which at 90.5 metres is the larger of the two vessels, has an additional two mini-guns. Last month it became the first Royal Navy warship to be painted in dazzle camouflage since the second world war, designed to make it more difficult for the enemy to judge its speed and where it is heading.

The mobilisation echoes the cod wars of the 1970s, when there were clashes on the high seas between British vessels and Icelandic fishers.

A Downing Street spokesperson said: "This evening the prime minister spoke to the chief minister of Jersey and the minister of external affairs, Ian Gorst, about the prospect of a blockade of Saint Helier.

"The prime minister and chief minister stressed the urgent need for a de-escalation in tensions and for dialogue between Jersey and France on fishing access."

Trial suggests tweaked jab neutralises variants

The first "tweaked" vaccine against the Covid variants that have emerged in South Africa and Brazil has successfully neutralised them in laboratory trials, the US firm Moderna has said.

The results of the small trial suggest that boosters against the variants will be feasible and could potentially be distributed this year to counter the threat from variants that have appeared around the world and are feared in some cases to be more transmissible or partially vaccine-resistant.

Leading companies have been racing to produce adapted versions of their Covid vaccines. Pfizer/BioN-Tech, which has a similar mRNA vaccine to Moderna's, and Oxford/ AstraZeneca are also in the process of developing tweaked vaccines against the South African variant, B1351, and the Brazilian variant, P1, which appear to be the major threats to current vaccine programmes.

Moderna became the first to announce results last night. They appear to be very positive, although only basic information from an initial analysis of 15
