MURDERS SPIKE AT RECORD RATE ACROSS THE U.S.

TIED TO THE PANDEMIC

Surge Seen in Cities Big and Small, Even as Other Crimes Fell

The United States experienced its biggest one-year increase on record in homicides in 2020, according to new figures released on Monday by the E.B.I., with some cities hitting record highs.

Although major crimes were down overall, there were an additional 4,901 homicides in 2020 compared with the year before, the largest leap since national records started in 1986. The significant rise has roughly coincided with the I8 months of the Covid-19 pandemic.

The higher murder rate has continued into 2021, although the pace has slowed as the year has progressed.

Overall, the toll of some 21,500 people killed last year is still well below the record set during the violence of the early 1990s. Still, several cities, like Albuquerque, Des Moines, Indianapolis, Memphis, Milwaukee and Syracuse, recorded their highest homicide numbers ever, according to the remort.

There is no simple explanation for the steep rise. A number of key factors are driving the violence, including the economic and social toll taken by the pandemic and a sharp increase in gun purchases.

Masks evidently were not powe ful enough to overcome other regional differences, like the amount of international travel that flows through major metro. that flows through major metro areas, which tend to be politically liberal.

liberal. Vaccination has changed the situation. The vaccines are pow-erful enough to overwhelm other differences between blue and red

differences between blue and red areas.


Some left-leaning communities—like many suburbs of New York, San Francisco and Washington, as well as much of New England—have such high vaccination rates that even the unvaccinated are partly protected by the low number of cases.

Conservative communities, on the other hand, have been walloped by the highly contagious Delta variant.

With Default Looming. Biden's Agenda Faces a Critical Juncture

WASHINGTON — Senate Republicans on Monday blocked a spending bill needed to avert a government shutdown this week and a federal debt default next month, moving the nation closer to the brink of fiscal crisis as they refused to allow Democrats to lift the limit on federal borrowing.

With a Thursday deadline looming to fund the government — and the country moving closer to a cat-astrophic debt-limit breach — the stalemate in the Senate reflected a bid by Republicans to undercut President Biden and other top Democrats at a critical moment, as they labor to keep the government running and enact an ambitious domestic agenda.

Republicans who had voted to raise the debt cap by trillions when their party controlled Washington argued on Monday that Democrats must shoulder the entire political burden for doing so now, given that they control the White House and both houses of Congress.

Their position was calculated to portray Democrats as ineffectual and the party divisions over a \$3.5 trillion social safety net and climate change bill, and to pave the way for a bipartisan \$1 trillion infrastructure measure whose fate is linked to it.

The package that was blocked on Monday, which also included emergency aid to support the resettlement of Afghan refugees and disaster recovery, would keep all government agencies funded through Dec. 3 and increase the debt ceiling through the end of 2022. But after the bill cleared the House a week earlier with just Democratic votes, it fell far short of the 60 votes needed to move forward in the Senate on Monday.

The vote was 48 to 50 to advance the measure. Senator Chuck Schumer of New York, the majority leader, was among those voting "no," a procedural maneuver to allow the bill to be reconsidered at some point. But there were no immediate details about next steps.

As Mayoral Vote Nears, Adams Turns to Bloomberg for Support

In the lead-up to and aftermath of the New York City mayoral primary, Eric Adams and his team sought guidance from current and past city leaders — first, to help craft his successful bid for the

Democratic nomination, and then to prepare for a likely transition to the mayoralty.

But Mr. Adams has recently come to lean on one person in particular: Michael R. Bloomberg.

In mid-September, Mr. Bloomberg released a video endorsement of Mr. Adams for mayor. The next day, at a business conference

featuring various of Mr. Bloom-berg's fellow billionaires, Mr. Ad-ams declared, "New York will no longer be anti-business." Two days later, Mr. Bloomberg hosted a fund-raiser for Mr. Ad-ams on the roof of the East 78th Street headquarters of Bloomberg Philanthropies, featuring dozens of guests, several of them finan-

cial sector executives.

Last Wednesday, one of Mr. Bloomberg's closest advisers, Howard Wolfson, met with David C. Banks, who is thought to be among Mr. Adams's top choices for schools chancellor.


