

Sunak faces Tory clamour to act now on cost of living

Retail Sales Climb **Despite** Inflation

Spending rose for the fourth straight month in April as shoppers remained resilient

Americans continued to pump money into the U.S. economy in April, with increased retail spending offering the latest sign consumers are driving demand at stores and manufacturers despite the pinch from high inflation.

Retail sales—a measure of spending at stores, online and in restaurants—rose a seasonally adjusted 0.9% last month compared with March, the Commerce Department said Tuesday. That marked the fourth straight month of higher retail spending.


Consumers spent more at restaurants and bars and boosted expenditures on vehicles, furniture, clothing and electronics in April. They cut spending sharply on gasoline even as pump prices pulled back briefly from a run-up related to the war in Ukraine. Retail sales aren't adjusted for inflation. That means that while consumers have continued to spend more, they are getting less due to rapidly rising prices.

"Today's numbers suggest that domestic demand momentum is very robust." said ING economist James Knightley. That gives the Federal Reserve



BUFFALO — President Biden delivered a defiant and at times emotional speech here on Tuesday, calling white supremacy "a poison" and urging all Americans to reject racist ideologies that some fear are gaining traction in the United State and that apparently as a Black neighborhood.

"In America, evil will not win," Biden said. "I promise you, hate will not prevail. White supremacy will not have the last word."

Invoking the racist "great replacement theory" that has been legitimized by some conservative commentators and GOP lawmakers and was embraced by the Buffalo suspect, Biden said that more leaders need to speak out against it and that tolerating it amounts to complicity. "I call on all Americans to reject the lie," the presidency appears the lie for power, political gain and for profit."

For Biden, the speech marked perhaps his most forceful condemnation of white supremacy since taking office, elevating an issue that he has in some ways put at the center of his presidency, even as some activists charge that he has not done enough to advance racial justice.

FDA authorizes Pfizer booster for ages 5 to 11

CDC advisers expected to recommend third shot for children as cases rise

Federal regulators authorized a coronavirus booster shot Tuesday for school-age children, a key step toward making a third shot of the Pfizer-BioNTech vaccine available to 5-to-11-year-olds as cases rise

nationally.

The Food and Drug Administration cleared the booster for use tration cleared the booster for use at least five months after children are fully vaccinated with the two-shot primary series. FDA Commissioner Robert M. Califf said in a statement that while covid-19 tends to be less severe in children, the wave of

infections caused by the omicron variant has resulted in "more kids getting sick with the disease and being hospitalized, and children may also experience longer term effects, even following initially mild disease." He said the agency was authorizing the booster to provide continued protection.

Advisers to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention are scheduled to meet Thursday and are expected to recommend the booster, which was shown in laboratory tests to strengthen children's immune defenses — particularly against the omicron variant.

Biden decries racist ʻpoison'

BUFFALO, N.Y. — President Biden on Tuesday condemned Saturday's deadly as a "racist rampage" and an act of "domestic terrorism," calling on Americans to reject the racist theory that authorities say appeared to have motivated the gunman to carry out the massacre.

"In America," he added, "evil will not win, I promise you. Hate will not prevail. And white supremacy will not have the last word."

Officials say the suspected killer, Payton Gendron, wrote a 180-page document that included referdron, wrote a 180-page document of white suprement" conspiracy theory, which posits that a cabal of elites are engineering the replacement of whites with non-white immigrants.

Gendron, 18, who lived 200 miles away in Conklin, N.Y., has been arrested and charged in the massacre.

"I call on all Americans to reject the lie, and I condemn those who spread the lie for profit." Biden said.

The president later told reporters that those who spread such racist concepts were not to blame "for this particular crime, but it serves no purpose, except for profit and/or political benefit."


