VIENNA—The Organization of the Petroleum Exporting Countries and its Russia-led allies agreed on Wednesday to slash output by 2 million barrels of oil a day, delegates said, a move likely to push up already-high global energy prices and help oil-exporting Russia pay for its war in Ukraine.

The move drew an immediate rebuke from the White House, which called the decision shortsighted and suggested the 23-member group, collectively known as OPEC*, was actively supporting President Vladimir Putin of Russia. It came less than three months after President Biden visited Saudi Arabia, the OPEC's de facto leader, in a bid to repair relations between the world's biggest crude-oil exporter during a period of rising inflation driven in part by high energy prices.

Global Trade Slowdown Raises Risk of Recession, WTO Says

World trade in goods is projected to slow sharply next year under the weight of high energy prices, rising interest rates and war-related disruptions, raising the risk of a global recession, according to a new forecast.

Total exports and imports of goods are likely to grow by just 1% in 2023, the World Trade Organization said Wednesday. That would be down from its previous forecast of 3.4% and its forecast of 3.5% for this year.

The WTO also lowered its

forecast for global economic growth in 2023 to 2.3% from earlier expectations of 3.3%, and warned of an even sharper slowdown should central banks raise interest rates too sharply in their efforts to tame high inflation.

The report follows multiple signs that global economic growth is weakening.

"The global economy faces a multipronged crisis," said Ngozi Okonjo-hweala, director-general of the WTO, the Geneva-based body responsible for enforcing the rules that govern global trade, at a news conference.
"The picture for 2023 has dark-

ened considerably."

The U.S. trade picture in August reflected the broad slowdown in demand.

Exports of goods dropped 0.3% in August from the previous month, the first decline since January, the Commerce Department said Wednesday. Goods imports fell L5% during the period.

When including both goods and services—such as tourism, education and healthcare—total U.S. exports fell 0.3% in August from July, while imports decreased 1.1%.

Oil prices had risen more than 5 per cent since Friday in the run-up to the meeting, and international benchmark Brent edged higher to 893-95 a barrel after news of the cut.



Many pension funds moved into illiquid private markets in search of higher yields during a decade of low interest rates. They began selling stakes in pri-

Even as group reduces production, experts say California drivers should see relief soon.

Gun shop license seizures triple

Uptick reflects Biden administration's new get-tough approach

Firearms and Explosives revoked gun store licenses at a higher rate in 2022 than in any year since 2006, according to data published by the agency Tues-

to data published by the agency Tuesday.

The numbers provide the first indication that federal investigators have cracked down on lawbreaking gun dealers following guidance from the Biden administration ordering the agency to take a harsher tack during inspections.

Altogether, the agency revoked 92 licenses in 2022 – roughly 1.3% of all the dealers inspected. The total more than triples the number of licenses revoked in 2021, when a similar number of dealers were inspected. Another 136 dealers received warning conferences, the steepest penalty inspectors can

dealers received warning conferences, the steepest penalty inspectors can recommend without revocation.

The pandemic hobbled the ATF's ability to conduct compliance inspections at gun stores, and the total number of inspections has yet to rebound to pre-pandemic levels, the data shows. Investigators conducted just over 7,000 inspections in 2022, compared with more than 13,000 in 2019. Still, they revoked more licenses in the past fiscal year than in any year since 2008.

David Chipman, a former ATF agent who now works as an advisory board member for the Center for Gun Vio-lence Solutions at Johns Hopkins Uni-versity, said he is encouraged by the

Digital age makes propaganda easy

Memes are weaponized to spread disinformation

Amid the haze of smoke grenades and bear spray unleashed as a mob stormed the U.S. Capitol on Jan. 6, 2021, were recognizable symbols that have been adopted by far-right ex-tremists: a noose and makeshift gal-lows; the Confederate stars and bars; and the coiled snake of the Gadsden

flag with its "Don't Tread On Me" warning.

But for those unfamiliar with certain Internet subcultures, less obvious but equally potent icons at the riot may have caused confusion. They included a green, anthropomorphic cartoon frog named Pepe on masks and clothing, and green flags with a black symbol spelling the word "Kek" waving above the crowd.

Both the frog and the flag – each associated with a fictional country called "Kekistan – are Internet memes that have come to represent ironic, tongue-in-cheek symbols of white nationalism.

Although their origin stories are bizarre, they are emblematic of how messaging on the fringes of the digital world has made the leap into real-world instances of violence, underscoring the impor-

of violence, underscoring the importance of recognizing the implicit and explicit threats they can represent.

USA TODAY reviewed thousands of Internet memes ranging from serious issues like the Jan. 6 hearings and the FBI's search of Mar-a-Lago, to absurd conspiracy theories concerning 5G and Jewish space lasers. The examination



Truss delivers a new common enemy to fractured Tory party

Poland's president asks US for nuclear weapons

Poland has asked to have US nuclear weapons based on its territory amid growing fears that Vladimir Putin could resort to using nuclear arms in Ukraine to stave off a rout of his invading army.

The request from the Polish president, Andrzej Duda, is widely seen as symbolic, as moving nuclear warheads closer to Russia would make them more vulnerable and less militarily useful, experts say. It comes as the US and its allies are seeking to deter Putin from the first nuclear use in battle but also preparing potential responses, if deterrence fails, that would have maximum punitive impact while containing the risk all-out nuclear war.

the risk all-out nuclear war. Previous war games conducted by US administrations have shown that is a fine, and fuzzy, line to tread, given the uncertainty over Putin's state of mind and his record of massive miscalculations over Ukraine.

Duda's remarks on basing nuclear

weapons followed changes in the constitution of neighbouring Belarus that would allow Russian nuclear weapons to be based on its territory.

The Polish president said there was "a potential opportunity" for Poland to take part in "nuclear sharing", by which pilots from the host country are trained to fly missions carrying US nuclear bombs, which are stored on their territory.
