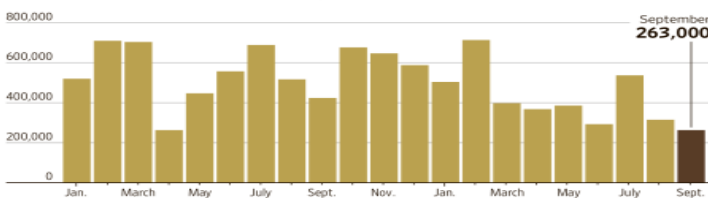

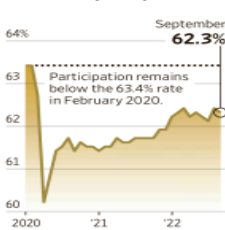

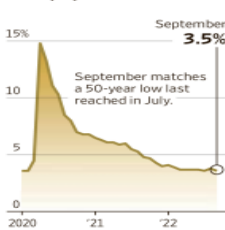
U.S. nonfarm payrolls, one-month net change



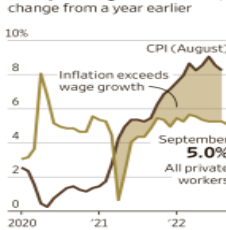
Labor-force participation rate



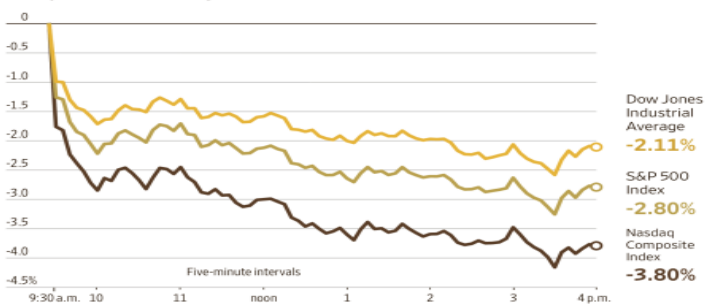
Unemployment rate

Jobs Data Show Few Cooling Signs

The U.S. labor market lost some momentum in September, but remained strong, as high inflation and rising interest rates weighed on the economy. Job growth slowed, with employers adding a seasonally adjusted 263,000 jobs in September, the Labor Department said Friday. The increase, while still robust, was less than August's increase of 315,000 and the monthly average gain of more than 400,000 during the first half of the year.

The unemployment rate fell to 3.5% last month from 3.7% in August, matching a half-century low that was last reached in July. The number of people in the labor force fell in September

after increasing the prior month.

Stocks fell and Treasury yields climbed on concern that the relative strength of the jobs market would keep the Federal Reserve on track to approve another large interest-rate increase at its meeting next month. Officials are trying to lift borrowing costs high enough to slow hiring, spending and investment to reduce four-decade-high inflation.

"We are seeing labor demand cool," said Sarah House, senior economist at Wells Fargo. "But we have a long way to go towards restoring balance."

Stocks Fall as Hope Of Fed Easing Fades

U.S. stocks slid Friday after a relatively strong jobs report, capping a roller-coaster week in which investors built up hopes for easier monetary policy—only to then give them up again.

The past few days were a wild stretch for markets, as investors grappled to understand competing data about where the economy is headed, and what that might mean for the Federal Reserve's efforts to cool inflation.

Stocks soared Monday and Tuesday, with the S&P 500 and Dow Jones Industrial Average logging their best two-day stretch since 2020. Weak data on the manufacturing sector and job openings led investors to bet that the Fed might slow its pace of interest-rate increases in the coming months.

The rally failed to last. Major indexes stumbled the next two days, then headed lower again Friday after the

After Ian, Litigation Expected In Florida

Litigation is looming for home insurers in Florida as cash-strapped, underinsured homeowners—paired with an aggressive plaintiffs' bar—are expected to turn to the court system to try to force payments for flood damage that the carriers say they aren't legally obligated to cover.

Fewer than one-third to just over 40% of the Florida homes in the two coastal counties hardest hit by Hurricane Ian are covered by flood policies, although standard homeowners' policies in the U.S. for decades have excluded flood damage. In some of the inland counties badly flooded by Ian's torrential rains, only a few out of every 100 homes have flood insurance.

At stake are potentially billions of dollars in proceeds from homeowners' policies that, if homeowners get their way, could close some of the insurance gap and help people rebuild and repair homes. Insurers say their flooding exclusions are solid and the premiums they charged didn't bake in responsibility for flooding damage. But determining whether wind or water actually caused the damage isn't always clear-cut, particularly if just a slab is left.

The stage is set for a potential litigation frenzy akin to the one after Hurricane Katrina devastated parts of Louisiana and Mississippi in 2005.

Memory-Chip Demand Dries Up

The pandemic boom in memory chips is on pause. A decline in prices in recent months has led the biggest memory players—including Samsung Electronics Co. and Micron Technology Inc.—to issue grim forecasts and under-

shoot already-lowered profit estimates. Others have pledged to trim production capacity plans fearing a worsening supply glut.

Chip executives and industry analysts don't see price declines bottoming out, or even moderating, until the middle of next year.

Memory chips—found in-

side smartphones, personal computers and data servers—provide a barometer of health for the semiconductor industry, which is reckoning with a sudden shift from pandemic strength to an abrupt drop-off in demand.

The average contract prices for the two major types of memory, called DRAM and NAND flash, dropped by 15% and 28%, respectively, from the prior quarter during the July-to-September period, according to TrendForce, a Taiwan-based market researcher.

Prices for both types of memory chips are expected to decline on a quarterly basis in the fourth quarter and all of next year, as excess inventory

builds up, TrendForce estimates. The double-digit declines are expected to end by the spring and be flat or minimal by the end of 2023.

The latest indication of pain came Friday, as Samsung, the world's largest memory maker, forecast a 32% drop in operating profits for the third quarter—far worse than analysts' expectations. And at the end of September, American rival Micron reported a 45% drop in profit and issued a subdued outlook for the current quarter. SK Hynix Inc., No. 2 in memory revenue, is expected to report a decline in operating profit of about 40% from a year earlier, according to analyst projections compiled by FactSet.

Memory chip prices began falling at the end of last year. Compared with other types of semiconductors, memory has a higher number of competing manufacturers, and the chips themselves are less differentiated from one another, making them more commoditized and sensitive to shifts in demand, said Avril Wu, a TrendForce research director who focuses on the memory market.

"Memory is usually the first component to feel the sting of demand shifts and show price declines," Ms. Wu said.

Memory represents about

Interior designer Chloe Mackintosh lives on a cattle farm, and even she is perplexed by the definition of Farmhouse interior design style.

Farmhouse has become a broad term, says Ms. Mackintosh, who lives 2.5 hours from Reno, Nev. Lately there are seemingly endless iterations, from Classic Farmhouse and Modern Farmhouse to Rustic Farmhouse and Industrial Farmhouse. Not to mention Urban Farmhouse.

There are also substyles within each Farmhouse style.

"If someone comes to me and says, 'I want Modern Farmhouse,' I'll show them two different designs that could both be described as Modern Farmhouse, yet they could be wildly different," she says. "It's like, 'Do you want Modern Farmhouse, or modern Modern Farmhouse, or modernized Farmhouse?'"

Many people have launched home-improvement projects in recent years, particularly after spending so much time in their living rooms and kitchens during the pandemic. Yet shopping for the renovation can feel like things have gone

to hell in a wicker basket. One might face a thousand variations of off-white, for instance.

And then there's the language of home decorating. It has never been particularly easy to understand, but it used to be somewhat straightforward with designers pulling from 15 to 20 style categories to describe a look—think Modern, Traditional, Art Deco, or Minimalism.

But lately, the internet, as it is wont to do, has divided groups into such a Byzantine tangle of micro-styles people are left scratching their heads trying to figure out just how to manifest a Cluttercore vibe mixed with a Plant Mom aesthetic fused with a Maximalism lifestyle.

Jobless rate signals big Fed rate rise

The robust pace of US jobs growth cooled in September but the unemployment rate unexpectedly dropped, firming expectations that the Federal Reserve will raise interest rates by another 0.75 percentage points at its next meeting in November.

The world's largest economy added 263,000 positions last month, fewer than the 315,000 posts in August and well below July's 537,000.

Despite the slower pace of growth, the unemployment rate edged back to its pre-pandemic low of 3.5 per cent as the share of Americans either employed or

seeking a job fell slightly. "The story is that a 0.75 percentage point hike in November is likely," said Tiffany Wilding, North America economist at PwC. "The Fed needs to continue to tighten."

Officials at the US central bank are discussing whether a fourth consecutive big rate rise is necessary next month or if they can downshift to raising rates in half-point increments. This year, the Fed has lifted its benchmark rate from near-zero to 3 per cent to 3.25 per cent.

The debate rests on how resilient the American economy continues to be and whether inflation is beginning to trend back to the Fed's 2 per cent target.

Yesterday's jobs report underscored

that the labour market remained quite strong, despite recent signs employers were beginning to scale back hiring.

Traders in fed funds futures contracts yesterday priced in the odds of a 0.75 percentage point rate rise next month at 82 per cent, according to CME Group, up from 75 per cent before the jobs report.

The S&P 500 was down 2.2 per cent at midday yesterday, having been flat ahead of the data. The yield on the rate-sensitive two-year US Treasury was up 0.04 percentage points to 4.29 per cent.

According to Alex Veroude, chief investment officer for fixed income at Insight Investment, the jobs data proved that a Fed "pivot" was not coming soon.



The US jobs market remains resilient despite some signs of hiring cutbacks

Fed officials this week have been adamant they are not considering scaling back tightening plans, even as the global economic outlook sours. John Williams, president of the New York branch of the Fed, echoed that message yesterday, saying more rate rises were required.

David Kelly, chief global strategist at JPMorgan, implored the Fed not to be too "dogmatic" with its policy plans to counter high inflation and to think more about economic forecasts when calibrating its rate rises. "If you can see a storm on the horizon, don't just make policy for the weather that you're experiencing at the moment," he said.

Peace prize Putin critics scoop Nobel

Ukraine's Center for Civil Liberties has documented alleged Russian war crimes since President Vladimir Putin annexed the Crimean peninsula in 2014. It now focuses on atrocities against civilians during the full-scale invasion.

The Nobel committee chair said the prize was not a snub to Putin, although it was announced on his 70th birthday.

Pink Floyd's \$500mn song catalogue sale hits a wall after band infighting

The \$500mn-plus sale of Pink Floyd's music catalogue has hit a wall, with the auction delayed by arguing between band members over tax, assets and bassist Roger Waters' claims that he is on an assassination hit list in Ukraine.

The dispute is jeopardising an expected payout for a song catalogue viewed as one of the most valuable assets to come to market during a boom in sales of vintage rock music.

With interest from a wide group of investors and music companies including Blackstone, Sony Music and Warner Music, Pink Floyd was expected to fetch more than \$500mn, making it one of the biggest music rights deals ever.

However, the auction process, which started in May, has been mired in drama

and delayed for months by disagreements between the band members over the deal's tax structure, according to several people involved in negotiations.

Waters lives in the US while other members are in the UK. His relations with Dave Gilmour have been strained for decades, making an agreement over a complex financial transaction fraught.

A bidder for the catalogue said the strained relationship had "made it impossible".

Another said they may never be able to close a deal, even if a buyer is chosen, because the band "never need an excuse to disagree". Negotiating the deal has been "as difficult as it is possible to be", said a person familiar with the talks.

Bidders have taken to calling the adviser handling the sale a "mediator". Bidders had been told the process would restart soon after stalling over

how to structure the deal in a tax efficient way. They still hope to reach an agreement in the coming weeks and talks are active, said people with knowledge of the details.

Waters' controversial comments this week, in which he claimed to be on a Ukrainian "kill list", have not helped matters, according to bidders involved.

Waters told Rolling Stone: "It's an unnecessary war... Russia should not have been encouraged to invade the Ukraine after they tried for 20 years to avoid it by suggesting diplomatic measures to western governments."

Band members Gilmour and Nick Mason this year released a song to support Ukraine, with proceeds going to Ukrainian humanitarian relief. Gilmour said he was "disappointed" by Waters.

Pink Floyd members did not immediately respond to requests for comment.



Evergrande boss 'owns London's priciest mansion

A 45-room mansion overlooking Hyde Park worth £210mn — London's most expensive house — is owned by the head of debt-stricken Chinese property group Evergrande, according to people familiar with the secretive purchase in January 2020. Hui Ka Yan, once China's richest man before the downturn in the group's fortunes, may be forced to sell the mansion but any buyers are likely to want a big discount on the record-breaking price of 2020.

Adams Invokes An Emergency Over Migrants

Mayor Eric Adams declared a state of emergency on Friday as the number of people in New York City's overwhelmed homeless shelters headed for a record amid the influx of thousands of migrants from Latin America.

He called for state and federal funding to help pay for housing and services, and urged the federal government to allow newly arrived asylum seekers to work legally and to slow the northward flow of migrants from the border. He spoke as the population of the city's main shelter system, which stood at 61,379 on Thursday, was set to break the record of 61,415 set in 2019. At least nine more migrant buses arrived on Friday.

Mr. Adams said that the migrants were on pace to send the shelter population soaring above 100,000 and that the influx could cost the city \$1 billion in the current fiscal year alone.

"We need help, and we need it now," Mr. Adams said in a speech. The mayor's declaration allows the city to open emergency relief centers more quickly by exempting them from the normal land-use and community-review process that often slows the opening of shelters.

"New York City is doing our part, and now others must step up and join us," Mr. Adams said. New York mayors have declared states of emergency in the past to free up resources and suspend local laws, including, during the monkeypox and Covid-19 outbreaks. But Mr. Adams's announcement on Friday was one of the few occasions he has given a major speech at City Hall.

Roughly 17,000 migrants, many of them fleeing Venezuela's economy, are now in the city.

The 66-Mile Trek From Despair to Uncertainty

DARIÉN GAP, Panama — Olga Ramos trekked for days through the jungle, crossing rivers, scaling mountains and carrying a diapered child through mud so deep it threatened to swallow them whole.

Along the way, she fell several times, passed a disabled child having a panic attack and saw the body of a dead man, his hands bound and tied to his neck.

Yet, like tens of thousands of other Venezuelans traversing this wild, roadless route known as the Darién Gap, Ms. Ramos believed that she would make it to the United States — just as her friends and neighbors had done weeks before.

"If I have to make this journey a

thousand times," said Ms. Ramos, a nurse, speaking at a camp many days into the forest, "a thousand times I will make it."

Ms. Ramos, 45, is part of an extraordinary movement of Venezuelans to the United States.

During the worst period of the crisis in Venezuela, 2015 through 2018, apprehensions of migrants at the southern border never passed 100 people a year, according to U.S. officials.

This year, more than 150,000 Venezuelans have arrived at the border.

Most have been inspired to make the harrowing and sometimes deadly journey as word has spread that the United States has no way to turn many of them back.

But their journeys — often poorly informed by videos ricocheting across social media — are producing brutal scenes in the Darién Gap, a 66-mile stretch of jungle terrain that connects South and Central America, a result of grinding, parallel crises unfolding to the north and south.

To the south, Venezuela, under an authoritarian government, has become a broken country, fueling a massive exodus of people seeking to feed their families. More than 6.8 million Venezuelans have left since 2015, according to the United Nations, mostly for other South American nations.

Nobel Peace Prize Carries Message in Shadow of Russia's War

The Nobel Peace Prize was awarded on Friday to human rights advocates in Russia, Ukraine and Belarus whose campaigns for democracy, civil liberties and accountability for crimes of the past represent a sharp chal-

lenge to the aggression and repression unleashed by President Vladimir V. Putin of Russia.

The Norwegian Nobel Committee awarded the annual prize to Memorial, the Russian organization shuttered by the Kremlin last year that has documented human rights abuses past and present; to the Center for Civil Liberties, a Ukrainian pro-democracy group;

and to Ales Bialiatski, an imprisoned Belarusian rights defender in Belarus.

That the prize went to representatives of all three countries

highlighted the long shadow of their shared Soviet past — one that Mr. Putin and his Belarusian ally, President Aleksandr G. Lukashenko, are striving to revive while Ukrainians die fighting a Russian invasion that is now in its eighth month.

To some Ukrainians, the Nobel Committee's decision to award the

U.S. Targeting China's Access To Technology

New Limits Are Placed on the Sale of Chips

WASHINGTON — The Biden administration on Friday announced sweeping new limits on the sale of semiconductor technology to China, a step aimed at crippling Beijing's access to critical technologies that are needed for everything from supercomputing to guiding weapons.

The moves are the clearest sign yet that a dangerous standoff between the world's two major superpowers is increasingly playing out in the technological sphere, with the United States trying to establish a stranglehold on advanced computing and semiconductor technology that is essential to China's military and economic ambitions.

The package of restrictions, which was released by the Commerce Department, is designed in large part to slow the progress of Chinese military programs, which use supercomputing to model nuclear blasts, guide hypersonic weapons and establish advanced networks for surveilling dissidents and minorities, among other activities.

Alan Estevez, the under secretary of commerce for industry and security, said his bureau was working to prevent China's military, intelligence and security services from acquiring sensitive technologies with military applications.

"The threat environment is always changing, and we are updating our policies today to make sure we're addressing the challenges posed by the P.R.C. while we continue our outreach and coordination with allies and partners," he said, referring to the People's Republic of China.

Technology experts said the rules appeared to impose the broadest export controls issued in a decade. While similar to the Trump administration's crackdown on the telecom giant Huawei, the new rules are far wider in scope, affecting dozens of Chinese firms. And unlike the Trump administration's approach — which was viewed as aggressive but scattershot — the rules appear to establish a more comprehensive policy that will stop cutting-edge exports to a range of Chinese technology companies and cut off China's nascent ability to produce advanced chips itself.

"It is an aggressive approach by the U.S. government to start to really impair the capability of China to indigenously develop certain of these critical technologies," said Emily Kilcrease, a senior fellow at Center for a New American Security, a think tank.

Companies will no longer be allowed to supply advanced com-

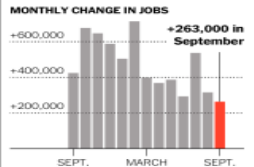

S&P 500 Falls 2.8% — Report Could Prolong Fed's Campaign

By SYDNEY EMBER

Job growth eased slightly in September but remained robust, indicating that the economy was maintaining momentum despite higher interest rates. But the strong showing left many investors unhappy because they saw signs that the fight against inflation may become tougher and more prolonged.

Employers added 263,000 jobs on a seasonally adjusted basis, the Labor Department said Friday, a decline from 315,000 in August. The number was the lowest since April 2021 but still solid by pre-pandemic standards. The unemployment rate fell to 3.5 percent, equalling a five-decade low.

"If I had just woken up from a really long nap and seen these numbers, I would conclude that we still have one of the strongest job markets that we've ever enjoyed," said Carl Tannenbaum, chief economist at Northern Trust.

Officials at the Federal Reserve have been keeping a close eye on hiring and wages as they proceed with a series of rate increases meant to combat inflation. The job data indicates that, for now, they are doing so without tipping the economy into a recession that would throw millions out of work.

But it also increases the prospect that the effort to subdue price increases will be more extended. For investors, that came as bad news, since higher interest rates raise costs for companies and weigh on stock prices.

The S&P 500 recorded its worst one-day performance since mid-September, falling 2.8 percent and eroding gains from earlier in the week. [Page B1.]

Scissors as a statement

Iranians across globe cut their hair to protest woman's death

By SARAH PARVINI

Standing before her bathroom mirror, Elnaz Rahimpour fluffed her curly hair before braiding the tendrils into four pieces.

She reached for the scissors and cut each dark lock with tears in her eyes, as an old Iranian resistance anthem streamed over the video she posted to Instagram — her own gesture of protest in solidarity with the movement that has coursed through Iran in the weeks since a 22-year-old woman, Mahsa Amini, died at a Tehran hospital after reportedly being brutalized by the country's morality police.

Amid protests across Iran, many women in the country have adopted the political symbolism of cutting their hair — at once a statement against oppression and the rules of compulsory hijab for women, and an act of defiance in honor of Amini, who was arrested for allegedly violating the Islamic Republic's modesty laws.

"So many others of my friends are still there dealing with this," said Rahimpour, 29, a student at Marshall University in West Virginia. "I wanted to show how horrible it is to kill someone because of something as simple as hair. ... Only because of her hair, Mahsa died. To me, it just felt like the right thing to do."

The protests that erupted across Iran on Sept. 16 have been led by women

Countries feel exodus from Russia's draft

TBILISI, Georgia — Less than three weeks ago, Russian President Vladimir Putin ordered the call-up of 300,000 men to bolster army ranks decimated by battle-field routs in Ukraine. Now, in an extraordinary exodus, waves of fighting-age men have fled Russia in what appear to be roughly those same numbers.

By plane or by bicycle, in

cars or on foot, at a rate sometimes reaching tens of thousands per day, Russian men desperate to avoid deployment to the front lines — or face long jail sentences for draft evasion — are seeking haven in neighboring and nearby countries.

They have crossed land borders into Finland or Mongolia, booked expensive air tickets to Turkey or Serbia, decamped for the former Soviet republics of Kazakhstan, Georgia and Armenia.

In one striking instance,

two Russian asylum seekers made their way by boat to a remote Alaskan island in the Bering Sea, the state's two U.S. senators said.

Within some destination countries, and across the wider West, there's sharp debate over whether those leaving are deserving of shelter.

Some argue that Russians who truly object to the war — and not merely to their own conscription — should be welcomed, or at least tolerated. Others point

State's volatile fuel market has no easy remedy

California remains vulnerable to price spikes at the pump as it pursues green goals.

By GRACE TOOHEY

California officials have had repeated warnings over the last two decades that the state's unique blend of gasoline is susceptible to supply shortages and sharp price spikes.

But despite multiple reports and special committees, California has struggled to find solutions as it tries to rapidly reduce its reliance on fossil fuels.

Motorists got a reminder of this in recent weeks as prices hit record levels in an increasingly fragile gasoline market, after almost half the state's refineries experienced recent or ongoing outages, pushing the supply of West Coast gasoline to its lowest level in a decade.

Yet state leaders remain far from a comprehensive fix.

"We've got to make long-run plans and not just

wait until the crisis is upon us," said Severin Borenstein, the director of UC Berkeley's Energy Institute at the Haas School of Business, who sat on statewide committees in 1999 and 2015 aimed at finding possible solutions for the state's volatile fuel market.

None were implemented, he said.

"There are actions we could take to try to smooth that" fluctuation in the gasoline market, Borenstein said, "but it requires some public policy."

State leaders and energy companies find themselves balancing California's aggressive green energy goals while providing affordable and reliable energy during this transitional time.

"Do I have the new infrastructure fast enough before I retire the old infrastructure, and what happens if you're in the middle?" said Amy Myers Jaffe, the managing director of Tufts University Climate Policy Lab and a former executive director for energy and sustainability at UC Davis.

"The way we're doing it now is you just let the fuel costs go up and then we leave poor people with no ability to get anywhere. ... And then [California leaders] grandstand against the oil companies — that's not a solution."

Family tells of '05 armed robbery by Merced suspect

They note similarities between that heist at gunpoint and recent killings of four people.

MERCED, Calif. — When Kathy and her daughter Katrina first saw surveillance images of the man accused of kidnapping and killing four members of a Merced family, they did not immediately recognize him.

Jesus Manuel Salgado, now 48, had aged significantly, and Kathy and Katrina weren't sure he was the man who robbed them at gunpoint in their dark garage 17 years ago.

Salgado was taken into custody Tuesday on suspicion of kidnapping and murder in the deaths of Jasdeep Singh, 36; his wife, Jasleen Kaur, 27; their 8-month-old daughter, Aroohi Dheri; and Singh's brother Amandeep Singh, 39.

The four were abducted at gunpoint from the family business a day earlier in an incident captured on surveillance video.

On Friday, Sukhdeep Singh, a brother of Jasdeep and Amandeep, confirmed that Salgado had worked for his brother's company, Unison Trucking.

Nearly two decades ago, Salgado had worked for Kathy and Katrina's family, which also owned a trucking company.

They noticed the methods in the two crimes seemed eerily similar: terrorize a family on their property at gunpoint and force them to follow orders under the threat of death.

"My heart is shattered for this family," said Katrina, who asked that their last name not be used.

This week's events took the women back to the night of Dec. 19, 2005.

Salgado had worked for their family's trucking company but was fired in 2004 because the family suspected him of stealing money, she and her mother said.

Kathy and Katrina remembered Salgado as unfailingly polite, if quiet.

"It was always, 'Yes, ma'am, no, ma'am,'" Kathy said.

Katrina recalled mornings when he would come into their house before her

The video app Triller is in trouble

As it plans to go public, the company faces multiple lawsuits

Two years ago, Century City startup Triller was poised for the big time.

The once-obscure entertainment and tech company got a sudden boost when then-President Trump floated the possibility that he'd ban TikTok from America over its ties to China. But TikTok's heir apparent in the U.S. now finds itself beset on all sides by haters, skeptics and litigants.

Cooling of job market bodes ill for economy

Unemployment still low, but hiring hits slowest patch since early '21

BY ABHA BHATTARAI

A robust job market that has defied expectations for years is showing more concrete signs of slowing.

Companies' job postings have fallen sharply. Layoffs are creeping up. And new data released Friday show that U.S. job creation has slowed to its lowest level in nearly a year and a half.

This is all a welcome development for the Federal Reserve, which has been trying to cool the economy to bring down widespread, stubborn inflation. However, new geopolitical turmoil threatening to renew energy price spikes in coming weeks could complicate the Fed's work, leading to a more protracted period of layoffs that could spiral into a recession.

"Things are cooling down, but this is just the beginning of the descent," said Giacomo Santangelo, an economist at the jobs site Monster. "We're still 30,000 feet in the air, and the fear is that we're going to hit the ground and keep falling."

That uncertainty sent stocks tumbling on Friday, as investors worried that the stronger labor report would lead the Fed to continue aggressively raising interest rates. By late afternoon, the S&P 500 had fallen roughly 2.8 percent, while the Dow Jones Industrial average was down more than 2 percent. The tech-heavy Nasdaq sank by 3.8 percent.

The number of jobs in the United States grew in September for the 21st consecutive month, and

As winter approaches, booster uptake is slow

Health experts cite pandemic fatigue and confusing messaging

Joe Gonzales, 37, said he knows there's still a risk of getting covid — he believes he was infected with the virus this summer. But after getting two doses of the vaccine, the Flower Mound, Tex., man doesn't understand why he needs the third and fourth "booster" shots urged by federal health officials.

"And then the president is saying things like, 'The pandemic is over,'" Gonzales said of President Biden's comments during a recent "60 Minutes" interview. "That doesn't help" motivate him to get a shot.

Gonzales's lack of urgency typi-

'Girl With a Flute' is found to be a faux Vermeer

National Gallery of Art confirms what scholars have long suspected

It has long been designated as dubious. Now it's official: "Girl With a Flute," one of the National Gallery of Art's four paintings attributed to Johannes Vermeer, is not, in fact, by Vermeer. Four are now three, and thanks to new combinations of scientific analysis, art historical insight and informed looking, a vexing, long-standing problem has been resolved.

In a news conference Friday, the museum shared the finding that an interdisciplinary team of curators, conservators and scientists has determined that the painting was made "by an associate of Vermeer — not by the Dutch artist himself."

Vermeer (1632-1675) is one of the world's most beloved painters. In normal times, people come to the National Gallery expecting to see all its Vermeers on display. It's hard to justify removing them to the conservation lab for more than a

Nobel goes to human rights defenders, in Putin rebuke

The prize committee named Ukraine's Center for Civil Liberties (CCL), which is working to document alleged war crimes by the Russian invaders; the Russian human rights group Memorial; and imprisoned Belarusian human rights advocate Ales Bialiatski as its annual Peace Prize winners, marking the second consecutive year Putin critics were among those designated for the award.

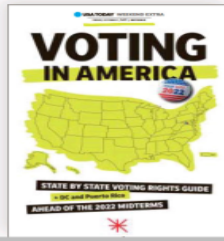

Undocumented Latinos lack savings, federal care

In 1998, Noe Ramirez crossed into the United States from Mexico, hoping to earn enough to buy a new taxi to replace the sputtering cab he drove in Mexico City. The part-time musician found construction work in Houston and played guitar on the weekends.

One morning as he rode his bike to work, he was hit by a drunken driver. The driver fled, leaving him bleeding on the street, his spinal cord crushed. After being hospitalized, he was taken in by a local shelter for undocumented migrants and received medical care through a county program for low-income residents.

Ramirez knows he might not be as lucky were something to happen to him again. Though he and his wife live

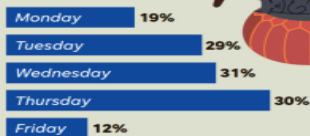

YOSEMITE NATIONAL PARK — Towering above the other trees in the Mariposa Grove, the Grizzly Giant stands like an adult among toddlers. Twenty-five feet across and almost 20 stories high, the estimated 3,000-year-old sequoia seems invincible.

But the iconic evergreens — and the beloved park around them — are facing a fierce and unrelenting adversary: climate change.

National Park Service forest ecologist Garrett Dickman bears witness to the struggle. A 22-year drought. Feroocious fires. Vanishing glaciers. Invasive species. Hotter summers and shorter winters.

Walking through the sequoia grove, one of three located in the national park visited by 3.3 million people last year, Dickman points out tree after tree killed by insects, thirst, or both.

"Sugar pine, ponderosa pine, white fir, giant sequoia. All dead," he said. "Millions of trees have died within the park's boundaries."

The nation's national parks are

Cracks show in labor market

Job cuts on rise ahead of holiday shopping season

Retail companies typically find themselves ramping up hiring for the holiday season this time of year, but job cuts in the sector are on the rise, another sign of a slowing labor market. U.S.-based employers announced nearly 30,000 job cuts last month, a 68% increase from a year earlier and a 46% increase from August, according to a report Thursday from outplacement firm Challenger, Gray & Christmas. Employers announced plans to hire 380,014 workers, the lowest September total since 2011.

"Some cracks are beginning to appear in the labor market. Hiring is slowing, and downsizing events are beginning to occur," Andrew Challenger, senior vice president of Challenger, Gray & Christmas, said in the report.

Which sectors are cutting jobs?

- The top five industries in cuts are:
- Automotive: 28,922 job reductions, up 194% from the year before.
 - Health care/products: 23,850, up 26%.
 - Technology: 18,620, up 86%.
 - Retail: 18,213, up 11%.
 - Services: 15,999, down 29%.

Why are jobs being eliminated?

Challenger said the cooling housing market and the Federal Reserve's interest rate increases have led to job reductions among mortgage staff at banks and lenders, and recession concerns have companies across sectors reassessing their staffing. And fewer hiring announcements in the retail sector suggests companies are waiting to see whether customers are ready to spend in the holiday shopping season before taking on more staff.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics is set to release the jobs report for September on Friday.

First Native American woman flies to space

Nicole Aunapu Mann has a message for future generations: Follow your dreams

Nicole Aunapu Mann has made history: She is the first Native American woman to launch into space.

Mann, 45, and fellow NASA astronaut Josh Cassada, Japan's Koichi Wakata and Russia's Anna Kikina orbited Earth in a Crew Dragon capsule launched by SpaceX on its way to the International Space Station.

A member of the Wailacki of the Round Valley Indian Tribes in California, Mann told the BBC she hopes she can "inspire young Native American children to follow their dreams and realize that some of those barriers are being broken down."

Mann is a Marine colonel and former test pilot. As mission commander, she's responsible for all phases of flight, from launch to reentry. She told the BBC, "I have a special dreamcatcher my mother gave me, which will be another little piece of my family to carry with me."

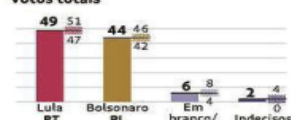

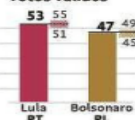

A primeira pesquisa de intenção de voto para o segundo turno da eleição presidencial feita pelo Datafolha indica que Luiz Inácio Lula da Silva (PT) tem, neste momento, 49% das preferências ante 44% de Jair Bolsonaro. Os que se dizem indecisos ou não responderam somam 2%, e 6% declaram que votarão em branco ou anularão o voto no dia 30.

Foram ouvidos 2.884 eleitores do dia 5 ao dia 7, e a margem de erro é de dois pontos a mais ou a menos. Ou seja: Lula tem de 47% a 51% das preferências, e Bolsonaro, de 42% a 46%.

O petista liderou o primeiro turno por 48% a 43%. O resultado oficial exclui brancos e nulos — nesse caso, diz o Datafolha, Lula teria hoje 53% ante 47% do oponente.

Le voile et le glaive

Depuis plus de trois semaines, le régime clerical iranien réprime avec une brutalité inouïe des manifestations déclenchées dans tout le pays par la mort d'une jeune fille de 22 ans, Masha Amin, aux mains de la police religieuse. Plus de 150 personnes auraient été tuées par balle, battues et jetées des toits, des centaines d'autres blessées et des milliers arrêtées. Cette folie meurtrière, face à la plus longue vague de protestations qu'ait connue la théocratie islamiste en quarante-trois ans, révèle sa nature profonde - un pouvoir sclérosé, violent, corrompu et irréformable. C'est à cette aune qu'il faut apprécier sa haine d'Israël, sa diabolisation de l'Occident et sa quête de l'arme nucléaire.

Masha avait été arrêtée pour port « incorrect » du foulard islamique. Chez nous, des féministes se coupent une mèche de cheveux par solidarité, mais défendent le voile comme un droit de la femme. Tout juste auréolée du prix Nobel de littérature, Annie Ernaux a tenu à soutenir la révolte des Iraniennes « contre cette contrainte absolue », pour aussitôt prôner « la liberté de porter le voile en France », où « personne ne contraind les femmes ». Vraiment ?! Seule compte la loi, donc : les pressions sociales, mo-

rales, patriarcales n'existent sans doute pas... C'est au nom de la même tolérance envers l'intolérance que les institutions européennes sont régulièrement épinglées pour leur promotion du voile islamique : « La liberté est dans le hijab », disait l'an dernier un slogan de la Commission de Bruxelles. On entend d'ici les hurlements si le Vatican se hasardait de nos jours à prescrire la longueur désirable des jupes : un commandement religieux rétrograde et inacceptable, assurément !

Les féministes ne voient pas ce dont témoignent les Iraniennes

Nos belles âmes ne veulent pas voir ce dont témoignent les Iraniennes : le voile est le glaive qu'utilise l'islamisme au jour le jour pour soumettre les femmes.
